Jaipur: The Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) convened the quarterly State-Level Joint Coordination Committee (JCC) meeting for Rajasthan in Jaipur to strengthen coordinated efforts among enforcement agencies in combating drug trafficking and implementing a comprehensive strategy against narcotics-related crimes, officials said on Sunday.

The meeting was jointly chaired by the Deputy Director General (Western Region) of the NCB and the Inspector General of the Anti-Narcotics Task Force (ANTF), Rajasthan.

Senior representatives from several central and state agencies, including the National Investigation Agency (NIA), Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI), Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC), Intelligence Bureau (IB), Income Tax Department, Central Bureau of Narcotics (CBN), Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Drug Controller's Office and other concerned departments, participated in the deliberations.

The participants also deliberated on monitoring 50 identified cases registered under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act to ensure their early disposal, expediting proposals under the Prevention of Illicit Traffic in Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (PIT-NDPS) Act, strengthening financial investigations and dismantling organised drug trafficking networks through greater inter- agency coordination.

The participating agencies also reviewed several significant narcotics seizures and important cases handled over the recent months.

Discussions focused on promoting intelligence-based joint operations, conducting coordinated interrogations, ensuring timely sharing of actionable information among agencies, and enhancing public awareness campaigns along with de-addiction initiatives to curb the growing menace of narcotics.

The meeting concluded with a series of actionable directions aimed at ensuring the effective implementation of the Vision Document on Drug Control and further strengthening the collective response of all enforcement agencies against drug trafficking in Rajasthan.

The participating agencies also reaffirmed their commitment to achieving the national objective of building a Drug-Free India through sustained cooperation and coordinated enforcement efforts.

Bengaluru, July 19 (IANS) Officials of the NCB discussed strategies to enhance inter-agency coordination and strengthen enforcement measures during the quarterly state-level Joint Coordination Committee (JCC) meeting for Karnataka held here, an official said on Sunday.

The meeting was convened to tackle emerging narcotics threats by implementing a comprehensive strategy against narcotics-related crimes, the official said in a statement.

The meeting, chaired by NCB DDG (South Western Region), brought together senior officers from DRI, Customs, ED, IB, NIA, Income Tax, RPF, CDSCO, State ANTF, Drug Control Department and Karnataka State Excise Department to strengthen institutional collaboration against drug trafficking in the state.

The deliberations focused on the implementation of the National Roadmap for Narcotics Control with a unified vision, emerging drug trafficking trends, preventive detention under PIT-NDPS Act, financial investigations, monitoring of precursor chemicals, identification of fugitives and strengthening intelligence-led enforcement, said the statement.

Reaffirming their collective commitment to a Drug-Free India, the participating agencies agreed to enhance coordination among stakeholders and strengthen the collective response to drug trafficking, it said.

The meeting in Bengaluru coincided with a similar round of deliberations in Jaipur as part of the quarterly State-Level Joint Coordination Committee (JCC) meeting for Rajasthan, said a statement.

The meeting was jointly chaired by the Deputy Director General (Western Region) of the NCB and the Inspector General of the Anti-Narcotics Task Force (ANTF), Rajasthan.

Lebanese food influencer sentenced to life for drug smuggling

Beirut, Lebanon – The popular Lebanese food influencer, known as Dr Food and dubbed Lebanon’s Breaking Bad, has been sentenced to life in prison with hard labour for drug smuggling.

Hashish reportedly hidden in cake packaging produced in Baalbek in eastern Lebanon was transported to Turkiye and then shipped internationally.

Georges Hanna Dib and other Lebanese and Syrian nationals were sentenced under Lebanon’s Narcotics Law, which covers the manufacturing of banned drugs, according to reports.

Judge Elie al-Helou, sentenced him to life imprisonment with hard labour and fined him 120 million Lebanese pounds (\$1,341).

The sentencing comes after a 2024 drug bust involving 820kg (1,800 pounds) of hashish hidden in cake packaging.

Dib, who is not a real doctor but has more than five million followers on TikTok, is believed to be out of the country. He and others who were sentenced in their absence were also stripped of their civil rights.

Dib was recommended a life sentence and hard labour in February last year when a Mount Lebanon investigative judge charged him with “manufacturing, trafficking, and smuggling drugs abroad”.

On Sunday, Dr Food’s Instagram page made no mention of the court case or any reaction to the sentencing. The page shared a giveaway that his food product brand was running.

People who received the message, posted it on TikTok and received 100,000 views would win \$100 from the influencer.

In one video posted to Instagram, Dr Food appears to be filming himself in his car but does not address the court’s decision.

His last story was posted on March 27 from Beirut’s waterfront. There, he is asking displaced Lebanese what they miss eating and then proceeds to order food for them from some of Lebanon’s most popular food chains.

Lebanon’s Bekaa Valley is notorious for hashish production. Last November, Lebanese police arrested Noah Zaiter, a 48-year-old drug trafficker, known as the Lebanese Pablo Escobar. He was sentenced to four months in prison in February.

Indian suspects in 8 kg drug smuggling case remanded pending trial

The two Indians arrested in connection with a drug smuggling bust at Velana International Airport (VIA), remanded in police custody pending trial, July 15, 2026.

Two Indian nationals arrested last month in connection with the smuggling of more than eight kilograms of drugs into the Maldives have been ordered to remain in custody pending trial.

Police arrested five suspects at Velana International Airport (VIA) in early June after more than 8.3 kilograms of drugs were discovered concealed in false bottoms of luggage brought from Bengaluru, India. The suspects are:

- Mohamed Mushtaq Jamal, 29, India
- Sirajuddin Rashitha, 26, India
- Ahmed Afrah, 33, Feyrugasdoshuge, Mukurimagu, L. Gan
- Ilyas Ahmed, 42, H. Kahafathi, Male'
- Hassan Shammoon, 36, G. Heli, Male'

The three Maldivian suspects were remanded for 30 days by the Criminal Court on June 25, with their remand set to expire on July 25.

The two Indian nationals were produced before the Criminal Court on Wednesday after their previous remand expired. According to the court order, Customs officers x-rayed the luggage the pair brought from Bengaluru and detected irregularities at the bottom. A closer inspection revealed a false bottom containing substances suspected to be drugs.

The court order states that laboratory analysis confirmed the substances tested positive for Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and Cannabinol, with a total weight of 8.3 kilograms.

Both suspects told the court that the luggage had been arranged by a man known as "Bhai", who allegedly promised them payment. The court order does not provide further details about this individual.

The Criminal Court ruled that the two men must remain in custody pending trial, stating that releasing them would pose a threat to public safety.

The case falls under the amended Narcotics Act, which came into force in March. The amendment introduces the death penalty for importing certain quantities of specified drugs. Under the law, the death sentence can only be imposed if all Supreme Court justices agree. If the judges do not reach consensus, the penalty becomes life imprisonment along with a fine between MVR 100,000 and MVR 10 million.

Indian man freed from Saudi jail with blood money held in drug case

Kannur: A man who returned from Saudi Arabia after securing his release through the payment of Rs 80 lakh as blood money was arrested for allegedly masterminding an interstate narcotics racket in Iritty here, police said on Friday, July 17.

The accused, Fazaluddin T (45), a native of Karikottakkari, here was arrested on July 14 following an investigation into a methamphetamine trafficking network, they said.

According to police, Fazaluddin was arrested in Saudi Arabia in 2006 for allegedly murdering a Mangaluru native while working there as a taxi driver.

He was released from prison in 2016 after voluntary organisations raised Rs 80 lakh through a public fund collection and paid it as blood money, police said.

After returning to India, Fazaluddin moved to Bengaluru and started working at a tea shop.

However, in 2023, he was arrested by the Bengaluru police for allegedly possessing around 50 kg of ganja, police said.

During his stay in a Bengaluru jail, Fazaluddin allegedly established links with members of major drug syndicates, police said.

After being released from jail in January this year, he returned to Iritty and started working at an eatery.

Police said the breakthrough came after the arrest of an Iritty native with methamphetamine last month.

The subsequent investigation revealed that the seized drug had allegedly been supplied through a network headed by Fazaluddin, they said.

Following days of surveillance, police intercepted and arrested him on July 14.

Police said they would approach the court seeking his custody to identify other members of the racket and trace its wider network.

Security Forces Seize Rs 85 Crore Crystal Meth in Manipur

In a major blow to drug trafficking networks, security forces in Manipur have seized 6.2 kg of crystal methamphetamine valued at over Rs 85 crore in the international market and arrested a suspected drug peddler during a joint operation in Imphal West district, police said on Sunday.

The accused, Md Yusub alias Kaki alias Jakir (41), a resident of Imphal East district, was apprehended on Saturday during an intelligence-based operation carried out by the 164 Battalion of the Border Security Force (BSF), Koirengei, and the Imphal West district commando unit.

Police said the operation was launched at around 4 pm following specific inputs about the movement of a large consignment of narcotics in the Imphal West area. Acting on the information, the joint team intercepted the suspect at Khuman Lampak and recovered the methamphetamine from his possession.

A case has been registered under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act, and investigators are working to trace the origin of the consignment and identify others involved in the trafficking network.

In another anti-drug operation on Saturday, security forces seized around 1 kg of brown sugar concealed inside 81 soap cases from a Bolero vehicle (registration number MN01AS-9809) at Thingkangphai village in Churachandpur district.

The twin seizures come amid intensified efforts by security agencies to dismantle drug trafficking networks operating in Manipur, which has emerged as a key transit corridor for narcotics smuggled across the India-Myanmar border.

Hyderabad Police seize drugs worth Rs 22.17 crore in year-long crackdown

Hyderabad City Police registered 563 NDPS cases and seized narcotics worth Rs 22.17 crore between June 2025 and June 2026. The anti-drug drive targeted supply networks, strengthened screening of drug users and expanded rehabilitation efforts with support from multiple agencies

Hyderabad: In a crackdown on the growing drug menace, the Hyderabad City Police have registered 563 NDPS cases and seized banned narcotics worth Rs 22.17 crore over the past year as part of a sustained campaign aimed at dismantling supply networks and curbing substance abuse in the city.

The year-long special drive, carried out from June 2025 to June 2026 by Law and Order teams in coordination with the Hyderabad Narcotics Enforcement Wing (H-NEW), focused on identifying drug suppliers, intercepting transportation routes and taking action against local distribution networks.

An analysis of cases registered across the Hyderabad Commissionerate revealed that Jubilee Hills Zone recorded the highest number of cases at 116, while Shamshabad Zone recorded 30 cases.

Ganja formed the largest share of the seizures, with police confiscating 2,513 kg valued at Rs 12.56 crore. The crackdown also led to the seizure of 55.3 litres of hash oil worth Rs 6.91 crore, 1,626 grams of MDMA valued at Rs 1.62 crore, 129 grams of cocaine worth Rs 64.50 lakh, 120 grams of heroin valued at Rs 24 lakh, 570 LSD blots worth Rs 17.10 lakh and 220 grams of opium.

Recently, 'Operation Thunderbolt', a major cordon and search operation, was conducted at Mangar Basti under the Habeebnagar police station limits, involving more than 1,100 personnel. The operation resulted in the seizure of ganja and illicit liquor.

Hyderabad Police Commissioner VC Sajjanar said similar operations would continue with the support of Central and State agencies, including the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB), Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) and EAGLE.

Meanwhile, H-NEW has strengthened drug screening of suspected consumers and offenders. Of the 1,550 persons tested so far, 421 were found positive. In a shift from a purely punitive approach, police are referring drug users to Gandhi Hospital, Erragadda Institute of Mental Health and rehabilitation centres for medical treatment, counselling and reintegration into society.

Drugs and car worth Rs 3.31 lakh seized

Udupi: A special team of the Udupi Police on Sunday arrested three drug peddlers who were allegedly selling banned narcotic substances to the public in Kapu, Udupi, Manipal and Karkala areas of the district.

Police seized MDMA powder, hydro ganja, a car and other items worth a total of Rs 3,31,500 from the accused.

The arrested have been identified as Vijay Poojary (36), a resident of Pithrody in Udyavara, Udupi taluk; P.A. Mohammed Sammas (24), a resident of Kukkundoor; and Akash Shetty (20), a resident of Miyaru village in Karkala taluk.

The accused were arrested after police acted on specific information that they were attempting to sell narcotic substances at a public place in Budnar of Shivalli village in Udupi taluk.

During the operation, police seized 4 grams of MDMA powder, 2.5 grams of hydro ganja, 3.65 grams of MDMA tablets and 3 grams of ganja from the accused. A car allegedly used to transport the drugs and other materials were also seized.

A case has been registered at the Udupi Town Police Station under Crime No. 95/2026 under Sections 8(c), 20(c) and 22(a) of the NDPS Act, 1985.

The operation was carried out under the guidance of Udupi Sub-Divisional Police Officer Belliyappa K.U. The special team was led by Malpe Police Inspector Ramachandra Nayak and included Udupi Traffic Police PSI Mahesh T.M.; Cyber Crime Police personnel Praveen Kumar; Hiriadka Police Station personnel Praveen Shettigar; Malpe Circle Office personnel Indresh, Hanumanth Aski, Manu Kumar, Rashmi Hegde and Ravi Kumar; and Udupi Traffic Police personnel Srinivasa, Santosh and Dinesh.

School owner who ran Alprazolam unit held again by EAGLE sleuths

Hyderabad: A school owner from Bowenpally, who was previously arrested for allegedly manufacturing Alprazolam on school premises, was caught again by EAGLE sleuths after he was found allegedly manufacturing the same drug at a poultry farm in Mahabubnagar. EAGLE sleuths seized 1 kg of Alprazolam from the poultry farm and arrested M Jaya Prakash Goud on Saturday. In Sept 2025, police arrested him after raiding the private school premises, where he was allegedly manufacturing Alprazolam in a room located at the rear of the building. Officials then seized 3.5 kg of Alprazolam. He remained in jail from Sept 2025 to March 2026. After obtaining bail from a local court in March, he was required to periodically appear before the investigating officer and sign the records as part of his bail conditions. However, over the past month, officials found his movements suspicious again. When surveillance was mounted on the accused, he was frequently seen visiting a poultry farm at Annasagar village in Bhoothpur, Mahabubnagar district. After taking Prakash into custody, officials questioned him about the illegal unit. They found that he was being assisted by three others: C Krishnaiah, G Balanjaneyulu and B Narasimhulu. During searches at the poultry farm, officials found that Alprazolam was being manufactured using various pieces of equipment. "The farm was taken on rent from Narasimhulu, who claimed that Prakash wanted to use it for manufacturing phenyl. However, we made the property owner an accused as permission from the Pollution Control Board (PCB) is mandatory even for manufacturing phenyl," EAGLE officials said. "Krishnaiah played an active role in setting up the facility. The investigation revealed that the manufactured Alprazolam was supplied to local dealers to adulterate toddy," officials said. Police said production at the unit had started only about 15 days ago. In 2025, after Prakash's arrest, the Education Department cancelled permission for his school. So far, 35 accused persons in the network have been arrested.

Man held with 1.5kg ganja

Peddlers Using NMC Properties As Narco Dumps? Citizens Want Action

Nagpur: Days after suspected marijuana plants were found inside a Nagpur Municipal Corporation (NMC) garden in Ajni's Gajanan Nagar, police on Saturday seized ganja allegedly concealed in the loft of an NMC Smart Toilet. The incidents have sparked concerns whether drug peddlers are misusing the properties as well as facilities of the civic body. On Sunday, TOI found the main entrance of the Smart Toilet in Nandanvan shut. Empty liquor bottles were strewn around the premises, suggesting the place may have been frequented by anti-social elements even before the police action. A spread mattress and water can were found in the loft, which can be accessed with a staircase. TOI couldn't verify whether the loft was occupied by someone appointed by NMC for maintenance purposes. The loft remained unsecured when TOI visited the place. Additionally, the door was found ajar. "This is appalling. If NMC can't handle all of its properties, then it should lease them out to private entities completely. At least that will ensure proper maintenance and keep such miscreants away," said Khushagra Joshi, a Nandanvan resident. "NMC must improve surveillance of its assets through regular inspections, deployment of security personnel and installation of functional CCTV cameras at vulnerable locations. Public infrastructure meant to serve citizens should not become a refuge for anti-social elements," said another resident, Shyamal Singh. Mayor Neeta Thakre told TOI that she will review the situation and take measures to dissuade such incidents from taking place in the future.

Wanted peddler caught after three-week hunt

Nagpur: Crime Branch arrested a 42-year-old man wanted in a case involving the seizure of MD (Mephedrone) worth over Rs 1.23 lakh. The accused, Mohammad Faizan Ansari, a resident of Mominpura, was caught on July 18 from the Teka Naka area in Jaripatka following a tip-off. The case dates back to June 25 when Tehsil police arrested 25-year-old Mohammad Sufiyan near the Tehsil police station. During a search, police recovered 12.25 grams of MD powder in a ziplock pouch in his trouser pocket. The contraband, valued at Rs 1.23 lakh, was seized, and a case was registered under the NDPS Act. Crime Branch officials laid a trap and arrested Ansari, who was allegedly absconding in the case. During questioning, he is said to have admitted to his involvement in the offence along with the previously arrested accused. After his arrest, Ansari was handed over to the Tehsil police for further investigation. Further investigation is underway.

Narco seizures worth Rs 7crore in June, 75% increase in MD cases

Nagpur: With narco mafia targeting Nagpur as a base and transit point in central India considering high demand for party drugs like MD, Nagpur police launched an anti-narcotics campaign and seized drugs worth around Rs 7 crore in June, which is an increase of around 123% compared to seizures worth around Rs 3.11 crore till May. Also, seizures in MD cases increased 75% year on year, dealing a blow to drug traffickers who exploit Nagpur's strategic location connecting Mumbai, Hyderabad, Chhattisgarh and Madhya Pradesh. The special operation completely focused on breaking these supply chains through sustained, intelligence-driven pressure. The surge in police action comes amid growing concerns over synthetic drugs like MD flooding markets, particularly targeting the youngsters at the parties. In June 2026, the city police registered 425 cases under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act, a sharp rise from 199 cases till May — an increase of 226 or 113.57%. MD cases climbed to 14, up from eight in June 2025. MD seizures soared to 9 kg, a massive 451% jump from 1.6 kg during the corresponding period last year. "Police teams carried out aggressive operations, including backward and forward linkage probes, analysis of financial transactions, monitoring of jail-released offenders and close surveillance of repeat offenders," said DCP Detection Deepak Aggarwal. This multi-pronged approach went beyond mere seizures to dismantle the entire narcotics ecosystem — from street-level peddlers to key suppliers, the DCP added. "Night nakabandis, intensified vehicle checks and AI-assisted surveillance played a pivotal role in intercepting consignments, while sustained focus on supply-and demand-side factors targeted the root problem," said Jt CP Navinchandra Reddy. "Nagpur police are determined to keep the pressure on narcotics syndicates. Special drives like this will continue with even greater intensity in the coming months," said an official. Additionally, operations also were planned against financial networks as well as interstate linkages.

Financial Investigation under Chapter VA of the NDPS Act: A Study of the Relationship between Criminal Investigation and Financial Investigation : Part - II

Cases under NDPS Act

DRUGS cases are complicated cases having huge societal impact. On the other hand, the proceeds of illicit traffic are also used to generate huge money which if further channelized for terror funding. The specialized agency to investigate terror financing is the National Investigating Agency. The Union Home Ministry transfers the initial case booked by empowered agencies like DRI/Customs/NCB to NIA for conducting investigation under UAPA Act, 1967. The NIA is also an empowered agency under Section 53 of the NDPS Act to conduct post-seizure investigation under the NDPS Act.

A question of vital arose in a case booked by Customs wherein heroin was concealed in trade goods which originated in Afghanistan i.e. liquorice roots (*mulethi*) and transferred to NIA by the Union Home Ministry. After the transfer of the transfer, search and seizure operations were carried out and an amount of Rs. 1.36 crores came to be seized under Section 102 of the Cr.P.C., 1973. Later, on conducting a Financial Investigation, it was found that the seized money had linkages to the illicit traffic and subsequently, a seizing order came to be issued under Chapter VA of the NDPS Act. The process of Chapter VA being completed as discussed herein above; the matter travelled to the Hon'ble High Court of Delhi by way of a Writ Petition.

The case was contested on various grounds before the Hon'ble High Court. The Ld. Counsel for the prosecution argued as under:

In this case, it was the Ld. Counsel for the prosecution argued that the frozen cash fell within the four corners of Chapter VA while the Ld. Defence Counsel did not present any argument on this front.

- **Burden of Proof Under Chapter VA** : Stressing on the fact that Section 68J cast s a reverse burden on the Affected (AP) Person (the petitioner-accused) it was argued that the onus was on the AP to disprove the case of the prosecution.
- **No link to the real and genuine business** : The petitioner-accused, despite being given ample time and opportunity, failed to provide the valid source of **Rs.1.34 Crores** seized from his residence. Neither he provided any valid reasons not ledgers in support of his contentions.
- **Confirmation of Freezing Order** : The Competent Authority evaluated the Freezing Order No. 02/2023 issued the NIA and then upheld the same by passing the Confirmation Order under Section 68F(2) of NDPS Act.

Apparently, there appears to be a tension faced by the investigating agency between the physical seizure on the spot at the scene of crime *vis a vis* freezing or seizing property while conducting Financial Investigation. The same is explained as under:

A. The On-Scene Physical Seizure (Immediate Action)

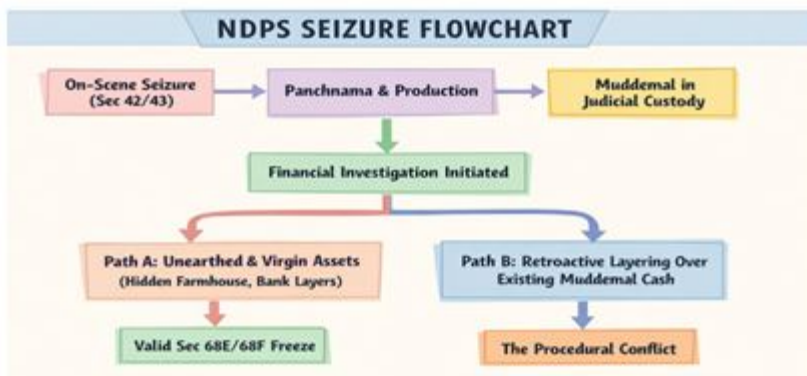
The seizure of contraband, cash, plant and machinery, conveyances, raw materials, etc. is the starting point for the criminal case. It happens on the spot at the time of the search, seizure, and arrest under Sections 42 or 43.

In this case the seizure of cash was effected under Section 102 of Cr. P.C., 1973 . The officer is duty-bound under Section 102(3) of the CrPC, 1973 corresponding to Section 106 of BNSS, 2023 (or the corresponding provisions of the NDPS Act) to inform the Ld. Court. [See **Ramzan Beevi in para *infra* for further details**]. Once produced, these items are securely immobilised as **muddemal** (case property) under the exclusive control of the judiciary (**custodia legis**).

B. The Financial Asset Freezing (Triggered After the Initial Seizure)

The separate, distinct action of freezing or seizing other properties (like bank accounts, real estate, luxury goods like watches, paintings, or luxury conveyances like cars, yachts, boats, aeroplane, helicopter) is triggered after the initial physical seizure. Once the initial physical seizure occurs, a parallel Financial Investigation is launched.

The flow chart is as under:



The process undertaken, *ad seriatim*, to unearth the illegally acquired property is as under:

- The initial search and seizure uncover the drugs, equipment, and on-scene cash, documents, conveyance, placing them under judicial custody.
- An Investigating Officer specifically empowered under Section 53 (distinct from the field officers under Section 42/43) conducts a comprehensive Financial Investigation.
- The empowered officer utilizes a specialized institutional intelligence grid, obtaining records from the Income Tax Department, commercial banks, non-banking financial institutions (NBFCs), Suspicious Transaction Reports (STRs), Cash Transaction Reports (CTRs), and Financial Intelligence Unit (FIU-IND) reports.
- Through this intelligence grid, the officer targets assets that are unearthed and unattached in character - whether movable (such as separate bank accounts/cash deposits) or immovable (such as a farmhouse) - **which become known strictly because of the Financial Investigation. Meaning thereby, they were hitherto unknown to the empowered department/officer.**
- Mere tracing and identifying is not sufficient; the empowered officer must also bring on record evidence which categorically demonstrates that the acquisition of the newly unearthed movable or immovable property is disproportionate to the declared sources of income (such as Income Tax Returns). If the officer has "reason to believe" these hidden, undeclared, and unearthed properties are the cumulatively disproportionate and form part of illicit traffic, he may issue a formal order under Section 68F to freeze or seize those assets.



Differentiating "Unearthed Property" from "Case Property"

A demarcation must be maintained between these two paths:

- **Newly Unearthed Proceeds of Crime:** These are the "unearthed and new assets" (the hidden farmhouse or unaccounted gold & silver and their manufacturers or undisclosed bank accounts, conveyances), hitherto unknown to the prosecution, through proper study of the financials after the initial search and seizure operations. This represents the true legislative definition of "tracing" - finding anew that which was hidden. These fall squarely within Section 68E.
- **Cash Already Forming Part of Judicial Case Property:** This is cash that was already uncovered, counted, documented in the initial scene-of-crime panchnama, and produced before the court. It sits securely immobilised. It cannot be handled without court's explicit permission. There is nothing new in this seized and documented cash.

The Central Issue

The intersection of these "Unearthed and New Property" from "Case Property" creates the core question of procedural propriety examined in this article:

Can an empowered officer, after having already brought cash into judicial custody through a statutory seizure under Section 42 or Section 43 of NDPS Act, subsequently invoke Chapter VA to issue an executive freezing or seizing order under Section 68F(1) in respect of the very same property?

The Competing Interpretations

View One:

The argument in favour of allowing the executive to freeze cash already held in judicial custody would rely on interpretation of Chapter VA:

- **Neutralisation of Proceeds:** The legislative objective of Chapter VA is the total neutralization of illegal gains (proceeds of crime) obtained out of illicit traffic.
- **The case of lengthy trials:** To plug the gap before a formal confiscation of the illegally obtained property under Sections 60, 61, 62 or 63 is passed, the executive can react at the quickest possible time given the fact that the proceedings are decided on preponderance of probability and the strict Rules of Evidence are inapplicable. By doing so, the fruits of illegal gains are not allowed to be enjoyed till the Ld. Trial Court gives its verdict. This effectively cuts off the financial flow sustaining illicit traffic.

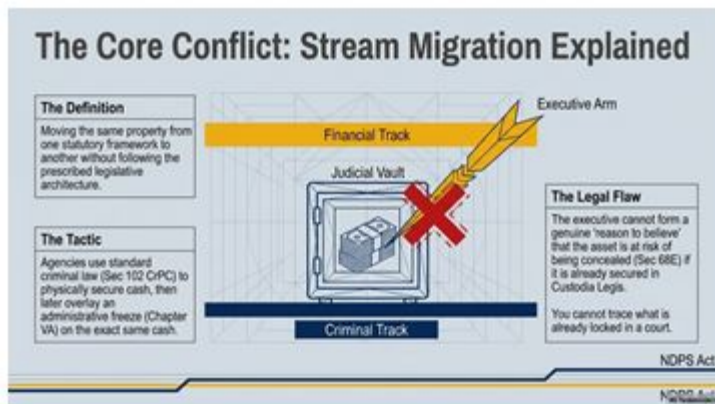
- **Speed and Administrative Autonomy:** Supplementing the above, the state requires an autonomous, rapid system to lock down wealth, and cannot be expected to approach the Ld. Trial Court constantly seeking their indulgence and such an arrangement would only clog the system further where the Ld. Courts would be saddled with additional workload. Judicial permission before dealing with illegally acquired property would frustrate the swift, economic mandates of the financial track.

View Two:

The Author's Analysis (Legislative Compartmentalisation)

Before we move forward, it is essential to understand the term "Stream migration" for a proper understanding of para *infra*.

Stream Migration: A Conceptual Explanation



For the purposes of this article, the expression "**stream migration**" refers to the movement of the same property from one statutory framework to another without following the procedural architecture prescribed by Parliament.

The NDPS Act contemplates two distinct statutory streams. The first is the **criminal investigation stream**, which governs search, seizure, arrest, investigation, prosecution, and judicial custody of case property. The second is the **Financial Investigation stream** embodied in Chapter VA, which is concerned with tracing, identifying, freezing, and ultimately forfeiting illegally acquired property derived from illicit traffic.

The concern arises when property that has already entered the criminal trial process and is under the custody and supervision of the criminal court is subsequently sought to be subjected to an independent administrative freezing or forfeiture mechanism under Chapter VA without first addressing the legal consequences of the property's existing judicial custody.

The expression "stream migration" is, therefore, not used to question the independent existence or importance of Chapter VA. Rather, it describes the procedural shift whereby the same property is sought to move from one statutory regime to another. The central question is whether such migration accords with the legislative architecture enacted by Parliament or whether the two statutory streams were intended to operate independently within their respective procedural boundaries.

Accordingly, the issue is not whether Chapter VA is an effective tool against illicit wealth - it undoubtedly is - but whether its invocation, in each factual matrix, faithfully adheres to the procedural design consciously incorporated into the NDPS Act.

Au contraire, quasi-judicial authorities, including Tribunals, being the creatures of the statutes (here NDPS Act) are subordinate to the Hon'ble Supreme Court and the Hon'ble High Courts. There is no doubt that the Appellate Tribunals are the final fact-finding authority and judicial discipline requires that they follow the Act (here NDPS Act) in letter and spirit. It is the respectful opinion of the Author that once property shifts into **custodia legis**, the executive is completely divested of any authority to re-seize or freeze it and any seizing/freezing order would mean encroachment into the powers of the judiciary. Needless to mention, the Constitution categorically separates the power of the executive and judiciary. Each one must act within the space provided. Notwithstanding the above, the following points also merit being considered:

- The **Boundary of "Tracing" and Identifying**: A reading of Section 68E reveals that the jurisdictional trigger for executive intervention under Chapter VA is strictly linked to "tracing" and "identifying." By definition, "tracing" refers to the power vested in the empowered officers to **identify, locate, and freeze financial proceeds and assets/property derived from illicit traffic**. **What is already known or seized cannot be traced, and hence, in the humble opinion of the author, falls outside the ambit of the term "tracing and identifying" used in Section 68E.** Cash securely held in *custodia legis* can neither be traced nor identified as a newly found movable property.

- **The embargo under Section 68F**: Under Section 68E(3), the empowered officer is duty bound to record "reason to believe" that the illegally acquired movable/immovable property is likely to be concealed, transferred, or dealt with in a manner that frustrates proceedings. For the seized cash forming case property, this risk is non-existent. **Because the cash is already physically and legally before the Ld. Court, the executive cannot genuinely form the mandatory statutory "reason to believe" that the seized cash is at risk of being disposed.**

- **The Bar on Unauthorized Stream Migration**: Two parallel streams have been envisaged under the NDPS Act and which deserve to be respected. An investigation must be fair, just, and transparent. Nothing prevents the investigating agency from informing the Ld. Court of the Financial Investigation and its outcomes. If an empowered officer unearths evidence linking the court-held cash to a wider syndicate, the transparent and lawful course of action is to file a supplementary charge-sheet (if available as per further investigation under Section 193(9) of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS), 2023) or a formal application before the Ld. Court holding custody, as in the case of disposal of seized drugs by the Drugs Disposal Committee. Unilaterally issuing a Freezing or Seizing Order appears to bypass the judicial supervision and reducing the court's custody to a temporary holding pattern. The executive cannot migrate the same property from one statutory stream to another unless expressly authorised.

Comparative Analysis: The Unique Architecture of the NDPS Act

To understand why this unauthorized migration is so problematic, the NDPS Act must be contrasted with other fiscal and economic legislations, such as the Customs Act, 1962.

The Customs Act Model

The Customs Act, 1962, is built upon a foundation of executive primacy. It is basically a fiscal statute with trappings of search, seizure, and arrest. The Customs Officer controls the search, seizure and arrest and decisions are taken by the Principal Commissioner/Commissioner of Customs to order for arrest and it must be recorded on the file as why the arrest is necessary. Some cases, such as those notified under Section 123 of the Customs Act or involving Allied Laws (like Antiques and Treasures Act) may trigger filing of complaint well within the period 60 days. It is required to be noted that the NDPS Act does not mandate prior approval of any senior officer for the purpose of search, seizure and arrest and the only requirement is submission of a report regarding search, seizure, and arrest within 48 hours under Section 57 of the NDPS Act.

Even in such cases (where the prosecution has filed a competent Court and is pending), when the cases are decided by the quasi-judicial authorities and the goods are confiscated, the final disposal of the gold, silver, foreign currencies, etc. are after filing an application seeking the Ld. Court's permission.

In other cases, involving filing of Bills of Entry, the property is seized, held, and confiscated by the executive itself. In this kind of a situation, the prosecution is filed after the adjudication process is over and the adjudicator gives his recommendation to launch prosecution and the Principal Commissioner/Commissioner of Customs would study the recommendations and see whether the same set of evidences would meet the high standards of proving a case beyond reasonable doubt. It is at this stage, the Ld. Courts enter the picture. Should the Customs prosecute the person, which is, of course, subject to meeting the monetary threshold and evidences available on record. Needless to mention, being an economic/fiscal statute, the limitation of filing a prosecution is protected by The Economic Offences (Inapplicability of Limitation) Act, 1974.

Why the NDPS Act is Differently Designed?

The NDPS Act occupies a unique space. It grants its empowered officer the expansive powers of an officer-in-charge of a police station, pulling them squarely into the arena of standard criminal procedure. Yet, when it transitions to Chapter VA, it attempts to mimic a purely fiscal, administrative forfeiture model.

Because the NDPS Act explicitly ties its criminal enforcement to the judicial oversight of a specialized Special Court from day one, its procedure is far more judicially centered than a standard fiscal statute. The executive cannot take recourse to administrative flexibilities like the Customs Act offers to justify the executive power over assets that have become Court Property (*muddemal*) of the Ld. Trial Court.

The Drug Disposal Committee Illustration

The intersection of executive authority and judicial control over case property is illustrated by the functioning of the Drug Disposal Committee (DDC) under Section 52A of the NDPS Act.

Section 52A of the NDPS Act outlines a detailed statutory mechanism where large quantities of seized narcotics, after being sampled, certified, and report of CRCL/FSL certifying it to falling under the ambit of NDPS Act, the Ld. Court is informed accordingly and also permission is sought for pre-trial disposal by way of incineration by an executive Drug Disposal Committee. This being done primarily to ensure that the same drugs do come into circulation.

The conveyances are also released by the Ld. Court upon an application being moved and Ld. Court, after hearing the rival submissions, decides the application.

The Particular Factual Matrix: Amritpal Singh v. Competent Authority

The real-world consequences of this procedural intersection are visible in the decision of the Delhi High Court in W.P.(CRL) 1747/2025, Amritpal Singh v. Competent Authority under NDPS Act & Anr. (Judgment dated July 01, 2026).

The Chronological Sequence is as under:



The Procedural Bypass

The Amritpal Singh case cleanly isolates the administrative manoeuvre used by investigating agencies. By labelling the initial physical recovery as a general criminal seizure under Section 102 CrPC, the agency placed the asset in a temporary judicial holding station. Then, a year later, the agency initiated Chapter VA proceedings, arguing that a fresh "reason to believe" had emerged regarding the drug-trafficking origins of the cash.

This sequence highlights the exact issue of procedural migration: the state utilized the criminal law track to physically capture and secure the cash, and then subsequently layered an executive Chapter VA freeze over it a year later to move the asset dispute into an administrative forum with a reversed burden of proof.

Ramzan Beevi v. State (NCB) (Madras High Court, 24 February 2026)

The decision of the Hon'ble Madras High Court in *Ramzan Beevi v. State (NCB)* deserves careful consideration as it examines the interplay between seizure of cash during investigation and the forfeiture mechanism contained in Chapter VA of the NDPS Act. Although the factual matrix differs materially from that in the NIA case, the decision provides useful guidance on the circumstances in which Section 68F may be invoked.

The facts, in brief, were these. The NCB recovered **2 kilograms of Methamphetamine** from the residence of the petitioner's husband, who was consequently arrested for offences punishable under Sections 8(c), 22(c), 28 and 29 of the NDPS Act. After his arrest, and acting upon the disclosure statement made by Accused No. 2, the investigating officers conducted a further search of the residential premises. During this search, cash amounting to **Rs. 32,84,000/-** was recovered and seized under **Section 102 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973**, corresponding to Section 106 of the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023. The seized cash was thereafter produced before the learned Trial Court, which directed that the amount be converted into a Fixed Deposit pending further orders.

The petitioner's wife subsequently approached the Hon'ble High Court seeking interim custody of the money. Her specific case was that the entire amount did not represent proceeds of illicit trafficking. She asserted, *inter alia*, that a sum of **Rs.3,00,000/-** had been received from her brothers for meeting the marriage expenses of her daughter and that the cash belonged to the family rather than representing proceeds derived from narcotic trafficking.

The respondent-NCB opposed the petition. Its stand was categorical that the seized cash represented proceeds derived from illicit trafficking and was consequently liable to confiscation under the provisions of the NDPS Act. However, the Hon'ble High Court noticed an important inconsistency in the procedure adopted by the investigating agency. While the respondent had already invoked the provisions of **Section 68F** by issuing freezing orders in respect of certain immovable properties, no corresponding order under Section 68F had been issued in respect of the seized cash. The Court observed that if the respondent's own case was that the cash constituted illegally acquired property, the statutory mechanism prescribed under Chapter VA ought to have been invoked in respect of the cash as well.

At the same time, the Hon'ble High Court did not accept the petitioner's explanation at face value. Instead, it held that the rival claims regarding the character of the seized money required adjudication by the Competent Authority under Chapter VA. Accordingly, the respondent-NCB was granted three weeks' time to invoke Section 68F. If such proceedings were initiated, the petitioner would be entitled to establish before the Competent Authority that the seized cash did not constitute proceeds derived from illicit trafficking. Only in the event of the respondent failing to invoke Section 68F within the stipulated period did the Court direct that the cash be released subject to appropriate conditions.

The factual matrix in the NIA case is materially different. In *Ramzan Beevi*, the seizure of cash was a direct consequence of the disclosure statement made by Accused No. 2 and the subsequent search conducted under the ordinary powers of criminal investigation. The respondent-NCB asserted that the cash represented proceeds derived from illicit trafficking. However, the judgment does not disclose any detailed Financial Investigation undertaken to establish the source, movement, disposition, ownership or financial trail of the seized cash before arriving at that conclusion. In contrast, the NIA did not immediately characterise the seized cash as proceeds of illicit traffic. It first undertook a comprehensive Financial Investigation, examined banking transactions, correlated documentary evidence, analysed the movement of funds, and only thereafter recorded the statutory satisfaction contemplated under Chapter VA. The distinction, therefore, lies not merely in the invocation of Section 68F, but in the existence of a demonstrable Financial Investigation satisfying the jurisdictional requirements contemplated under Section 68E before the conclusion regarding the character of the seized property was reached.

The Jurisprudential Question

The question raised is reproduced once again for ease of reference:

Can an empowered officer, after having already brought cash into judicial custody through a statutory seizure under Section 42 or Section 43 of NDPS Act, or Section 102 of Cr. P.C., 1973, subsequently invoke Chapter VA to issue an executive freezing or seizing order under Section 68F(1) in respect of the very same property?

The arguments and rebuttals can be tabulated as under:

Description	Arguments	Rebuttals
Purposive Interpretation	The aim of the empowered department is to neutralize the proceedings in a manner based on the facts and circumstances of the case. By crippling the financial system, the drug syndicate's lifeblood is taken away.	When the NDPS Act prescribes a methodology, the same must be followed and the empowered department/officer cannot choose convenience over the form required.
No Prejudice to Accused	It does not matter to the accused whether the cash has been seized under the provisions of Section 42/43 of NDPS Act & subsequently under Section 102 CrPC and Section 68F NDPS Act. The aim is to neutralise the ill-gotten proceeds of crime obtained through illicit traffic, particularly in a case where the accuse could not demonstrate, despite multiple opportunity given, the legal possession of the seized cash.	It forces the accused to defend in a judicial as well as quasi-judicial fora. The manner of decision making is different in these two regimes, which puts additional burden on him.
Fresh Reason to Believe	Drug dealings have become extremely complicated with a lot of professionals being roped in. A financial investigation cannot be completed within a short notice. Therefore, unearthing and linking the recovered and seized cash is a long drawn financial jigsaw, which can be solved only after proper analysis. Hence, completely a fresh and new "reason to believe" emerge which can be put into use for legitimate exercise of powers under Section 68F of the NDPS Act.	While assuming but admitting to the contention, it is the argument that despite the legal nexus there cannot be stream migration, when the NDPS Act does not allow. Fresh and new 'reason to believe' does not alter the legal position and the empowered department/Officer cannot use the 'balance of convenience' to its advantage. This must be viewed because the initial transfer of the case was to unearth terror-funding arising out of the initial case booked under NDPS Act.

Conclusion

The legislative objective of any criminal statute is to bring the perpetrators of crime to justice and the NDPS Act is no exception. The NDPS Act casts an enormous responsibility to dismantle the parallel system set up by the persons accused of illicit traffic. Chapter VA seeks to achieve neutralising illegal gains through an independent statutory mechanism of Financial Investigation directed towards tracing, identifying, freezing, and ultimately forfeiting illegally acquired property. The effectiveness of the NDPS Act lies not merely in the exercise of investigative powers but in ensuring that each statutory authority acts within the jurisdiction, procedure and safeguards prescribed by the Act. Respect for these boundaries set out in the NDPS Act preserves both the integrity of the criminal justice process and the legitimacy of the Financial Investigation framework. Chapter VA being a potent tool in the hands of the empowered department must be used effectively in the manner known to the law.

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Ramban admn retrieves Rs 2.5 cr worth land from drug peddlers

RAMBAN, July 19: As part of the ongoing 100-Day Nasha Mukht Jammu & Kashmir Campaign, the District Administration Ramban, in coordination with the Police, Revenue and Forest Departments, carried out a large-scale anti-encroachment drive in the district today.

Deputy Commissioner Ramban Mohammad Alyas Khan and Senior Superintendent of Police Ramban Arun Gupta supervised the drive. Joint teams comprising Executive Magistrates, Revenue officials, Police personnel and Forest Department staff participated in the operation.

During the exercise, the District Administration retrieved 18 Kanal 0.5 Marla of State land and 16 Kanal 4 Marla of Forest land that had been illegally occupied by drug peddlers. The total market value of the retrieved land is estimated at around Rs 2.5 crore.

The District Administration stated that the action reflects its zero-tolerance approach towards the drug trade and allied illegal activities. Reclaiming Government land from persons involved in drug peddling is aimed at dismantling illegal networks, safeguarding Government property and upholding the rule of law.

The administration reiterated that the campaign against drugs and encroachments will be intensified in the coming days. It made clear that strict legal action will be taken against anyone found involved in drug peddling or illegal occupation of Government land.

500 days of Yudh Nashian Virudh: 52,432 NDPS cases, 68,850 arrests

Chandigarh: Punjab Police has registered 52,432 FIRs under the NDPS Act and arrested 68,850 alleged drug traffickers during the 500-day Yudh Nashian Virudh campaign, averaging 105 FIRs and 138 arrests every day. Properties worth Rs 319 crore, allegedly acquired through the proceeds of the drug trade, have also been attached or confiscated. Director general of police (DGP) Gaurav Yadav on Sunday described the campaign as one of the state's most intensive crackdowns on the narcotics trade, driven by sustained enforcement, intelligence-led operations and community policing. He said 629 major traffickers, each allegedly found with more than 2 kg of heroin, were arrested during the drive. The police said the campaign also focused on rehabilitation, with 10,917 drug users extended immunity from prosecution under Section 64A of the NDPS Act to enable treatment instead of criminal action. According to the police, the Safe Punjab Anti-Drug Helpline received 46,342 anonymous tip-offs, leading to the arrest of 22,960 alleged traffickers. ADGP Nilabh Kishore said illegal structures raised on government land using drug money had also been demolished. The DGP claimed Punjab Police achieved an 89% conviction rate in NDPS cases, attributing it to improved investigations and closer coordination with prosecution agencies. He said the campaign, supported by over 24,000 village defence committees with 1.25 lakh members, would continue with intensified action against organised drug syndicates and greater community participation.

A police spokesperson said a police party of Police Station Achabal, during naka checking at Kanganhal, intercepted and apprehended Zubair Majeed Lone, son of Abdul Majeed Lone, a resident of Tailwani, "1.7 kg of a ganja powder-like substance was recovered during his personal search," he said.

The spokesperson said that in another operation, a police party of Police Station Bijbehara arrested Imran Nazir Dass, son of Nazir Ahmad Dass, a resident of Waghama, Bijbehara, during naka checking at Doodhnaad, Waghama. "Another accused, identified as Irshad Ahmad Dass, son of Ghulam Hassan Dass of Waghama, managed to flee from the spot. During the search, two bags containing 7.1 kg of poppy straw were recovered, and efforts are on to nab the absconding accused," the spokesperson said.

In Awantipora, the spokesperson said a police party led by the SHO of Police Station Khrew arrested Saqib Bashir Bhat, son of Bashir Ahmad Bhat, a resident of Khanmoh, Srinagar, during naka checking at Monpora Crossing. During his personal search, police recovered 3.21 grams of a heroin-like substance, the spokesperson added.

SAMBA, July 19: Intensifying its sustained campaign against drug trafficking under the Nasha Mukta Abhiyan, Samba police achieved another major success by arresting an interstate drug peddler and recovering approximately 25.59 grams of heroin- (Chitta) from his possession.

Police said acting on reliable information, a team from Police Station (PS) Samba along with teams of Police Posts (PPs) Rakh Amb Tali and SIDCO Samba established a Naka at SIDCO Chowk Samba, to intercept suspected drug trafficker. During the operation, the police intercepted a bus bearing Registration Number JK02DJ-6363, which was travelling from Amritsar towards Jammu.

During thorough checking of the bus and frisking of passengers, one individual aroused suspicion and was deboarded for further verification. Upon his personal search, the police recovered approximately 25.59 grams of heroin-like substance from his possession.

The accused has been identified as Satnam Singh, son of Puran Singh, a resident of Amritsar, Punjab. He was immediately taken into custody and the recovered contraband was seized.

A case FIR No.211/2026 U/S 8/21/22 NDPS Act has been registered at Police Station Samba and further investigation has been initiated to ascertain the backward and forward linkages of the drug network.

In another case Samba Police has arrested a drug peddler and recovered approximately 34.82 grams opium- from his possession within the jurisdiction of Police Station (PS) Ghagwal.

Police said a team of Police Station, Ghagwal during vehicle checking at Naka NHW Tapyal, intercepted a truck bearing Registration Number, JK21K-2156 which was coming from the Kathua side and moving towards Samba side. During checking, approximately 34.82 grams of opium-like substance (Afeem) was recovered from the possession of driver.

The drug peddler identified as Raghuvir Singh son of Gurmit Singh of Ward No. 01 Ramgarh district Samba has been arrested. The contraband item along with the truck has also been seized.

A case FIR No 74/2026 U/S 8/15/25 NDPS Act has been registered at Police Station Ghagwal and investigation started.

6 held with heroin, 3 pistols in Fazilka

Fazilka police have arrested six persons, including a juvenile, and recovered three pistols, 760 grams of heroin and ₹2.5 lakh in suspected drug money while foiling an alleged plan to commit a major crime, officials said.

The arrested accused have been identified as Aman Kumar alias Amna, Bhur Singh, Arshdeep and Karan. During the investigation, Paramjit Singh was arrested, while Sajan Singh, who is currently lodged in Faridkot jail, was nominated in the case, police said.

Sharing details, Fazilka senior superintendent of police (SSP) Gagan Ajit Singh said that a police team on patrol received a tip-off that a group of armed youths had assembled at a closed rice sheller near Tiwana Kalan village and were allegedly planning to commit a crime in Jalalabad.

“Acting on the information, police raided the premises and apprehended five accused, including a juvenile. During the investigation, another accused, Paramjit, was nominated and arrested. Police recovered three pistols, six magazines, four live cartridges, two sharp-edged weapons, 760 grams of heroin and ₹2.5 lakh suspected drug money from their possession, the SSP said.

A case has been registered at Jalalabad City police station under the relevant provisions of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS), the Arms Act and the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act.

The SSP said Aman has six criminal cases, including those under the Arms Act and the NDPS Act, while Sajan is involved in seven criminal cases related to theft, robbery, dacoity and the Arms Act.

Police are probing the gang's backward and forward links to identify others connected with the network, the SSP said.

LUCKNOW: In a crackdown on the illegal trade of narcotic and counterfeit medicines, the Uttar Pradesh Food Safety and Drug Administration (FSDA), in coordination with the local police, seized psychotropic drugs, codeine-based cough syrups and allopathic medicines worth Rs 1.13 crore from three unlicensed warehouses in Gonda district.

One accused has been arrested, while the alleged kingpin remains absconding.

The action was carried out as part of the state's special campaign against the illegal manufacture and distribution of fake and narcotic medicines.

Acting on intelligence inputs, the operation was conducted under the directions of the FSDA Headquarters, Lucknow, with a joint team comprising drug inspectors from nine districts and the Gonda police.

The raids were conducted over three consecutive days from July 16 to 18 in Bariyar Purwa Sonar Gali and Bargaon under Kotwali Nagar police station limits.

According to officials, the team initially inspected Aman Pharmaceuticals at its registered address on the Gonda-Balrampur Road in Jaynagra, Bargaon.

However, the firm was found to be non-functional at the declared premises, with no signboard or business activity at the location.

During further inquiry, the team reached the residence of the firm's proprietor, where Shivam Kasaudhan, brother of the proprietor Aman Kasaudhan, disclosed that they were operating the business from another location in Bariyar Purwa, Bhattha Sonar Gali without any valid drug licence.

Subsequent searches led to the discovery of two additional warehouses, both allegedly operating illegally without licences under the Drugs and Cosmetics Act.

Officials said the operators failed to produce any valid purchase invoices, stock registers or records relating to the procurement and sale of medicines during the inspection.

During the extensive search operation, officials seized a massive stock of psychotropic and allopathic medicines allegedly intended for illegal distribution.

The seizure included 53,712 Diptram Plus capsules, 14,700 Ultranim-P tablets, 59,256 Proxispas capsules, 2,82,960 Semplx Plus capsules, 32,160 Roemer Spas capsules, 1,96,000 Tramadol injections, 60,000 Alprazolam (Alzomac 0.5) tablets and 63 bottles of codeine phosphate syrups (Anrex/Onerex).

The total value of the seized medicines has been estimated at Rs 1.13 crore. Officials also collected 19 drug samples, which have been sent to the government laboratory for quality analysis.

Based on the laboratory findings and the outcome of the investigation, prosecution will be initiated under the relevant provisions of the Drugs and Cosmetics Act, 1940 against the persons and firms found responsible.

Police arrested Shivam Kasaudhan, son of Pramod Kasaudhan and a resident of Rani Bazar, Bargaon, from the spot.

His brother, Aman Kasaudhan, alleged to be the main proprietor and co-accused in the illegal operation, managed to flee.

Multiple police teams have been formed to trace and arrest him.

Given the large quantity of psychotropic medicines recovered and the alleged illegal trade in substances prone to abuse, an FIR (No. 676/2026, dated July 19) has been registered at Kotwali Nagar police station under Sections 8 and 21 of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act, 1985.

Officials said further investigation is underway to identify the supply chain and ascertain whether the network has links with other districts or states.

In another major crackdown on the illegal trade of counterfeit medicines, the Uttar Pradesh Food Safety and Drug Administration (FSDA), in coordination with Lucknow Police, uncovered an interstate network involved in the manufacture and distribution of fake and unlicensed medicines.

During the operation, officials seized suspected allopathic and narcotic medicines worth nearly Rs 25 lakh from illegal warehouses in Lucknow and registered an FIR against several accused.

Acting on intelligence inputs, a joint team of drug inspectors from multiple districts raided an unlicensed warehouse in Aminabad on July 8 and 9.

Officials recovered large quantities of medicines bearing labels of reputed brands, many of which contained spelling errors on the packaging, indicating they were prima facie counterfeit.

The operator, Ranjeet Singh Julka, allegedly failed to produce a valid drug licence, purchase invoices or stock records.

During questioning, investigators learnt that medicines were procured without bills from suppliers in Lucknow, Gonda, Sitapur and Varanasi before being sold in the market.

The FSDA collected 27 drug samples for laboratory testing and sealed medicines worth about Rs 21 lakh. In a linked raid at Bakshi Ka Talab, officials seized another Rs 3 lakh worth of suspected medicines and collected four additional samples.

Investigators also found evidence linking the racket to suppliers in Rajasthan, who allegedly manufactured counterfeit medicines for distribution in Uttar Pradesh.

Based on the findings, an FIR has been registered at Aminabad police station under relevant provisions of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS). Officials said prosecution under the Drugs and Cosmetics Act, 1940, will also be initiated after laboratory reports are received.

कोर्ट के विशिष्ट लोक अभियोजक निखिल व्यास ने बताया -23 जून 2018 को कोतवाली थाना पुलिस को मुखबिर से सूचना मिली थी कि मस्तान बाबा के पीछे पेट्रोल पंप के पास वाली गली में रहने वाला इरफान उर्फ राजा अपने घर से अवैध गांजे का कारोबार करता है।

सूचना मिलते ही तत्कालीन थानाप्रभारी पुलिस टीम के साथ दोपहर करीब 3:50 बजे मौके पर पहुंचे। पुलिस की जीप देखकर घर के बाहर बैठे दोनों युवक घबरा गए और घर के अंदर जाकर एक-एक थैला लेकर पीछे बांडी नदी की तरफ भागने लगे।

इसके आधार पर 18 जुलाई 2026 को विशिष्ट न्यायाधीश एनडीपीएस प्रकरण एवं अपर सेशन न्यायाधीश शरद तंवर ने मस्तान बाबा क्षेत्र निवासी 28 वर्षीय इरफान उर्फ राजा पुत्र सलीम खान और उसके 38 वर्षीय भाई इमरान पुत्र सलीम खान को अवैध रूप से मादक पदार्थ रखने और तस्करी का दोषी मानते हुए साढ़े तीन-तीन साल की सजा और 30-30 हजार रुपए जुर्माने से दंडित किया।

हेरोइन बनाने में इस्तेमाल होने वाला 1.25 करोड़ रुपये का रसायन बरेली में जब्त, चार हिरासत में

बरेली (उप्र), 19 जुलाई (भाषा) उत्तर प्रदेश के मादक पदार्थ रोधी कार्य बल (एएनटीएफ) और शाही थाना पुलिस की संयुक्त टीम ने रविवार को बरेली जिले में 1.25 करोड़ रुपये से अधिक मूल्य का 498.35 किलोग्राम 'एसिटिक एनहाइड्राइड' जब्त किया और चार लोगों को हिरासत में लिया। पुलिस ने यह जानकारी दी।

'एसिटिक एनहाइड्राइड' एक नियंत्रित रसायन है, जिसका इस्तेमाल हेरोइन बनाने में किया जाता है।

पुलिस ने बताया कि इस मामले में स्वापक औषधि और मनःप्रभावी पदार्थ (एनडीपीएस) अधिनियम के तहत प्राथमिकी दर्ज की गई है।

पुलिस अधीक्षक (दक्षिण) अंशिका वर्मा ने बताया कि संयुक्त अभियान में 'एसिटिक एनहाइड्राइड' की कथित तौर पर आपूर्ति करने वाले गिरोह को निशाना बनाया गया।

उन्होंने बताया कि हिरासत में लिए गए लोगों की पहचान जोगेश, तेजपाल, अरुण और वासिद के रूप में हुई है।

वर्मा ने बताया कि जोगेश को पहले भी इसी तरह के एक मामले में स्वापक नियंत्रण ब्यूरो (एनसीबी), लखनऊ ने गिरफ्तार किया था और बाद में उसे जेल भेज दिया गया था।

अधिकारियों ने बताया कि रसायन के अलावा आरोपियों के पास से एक पिकअप वाहन, एक कार और चार मोबाइल फोन जब्त किए गए हैं।

पुलिस ने बताया कि रसायन की आपूर्ति करने वालों और इसे प्राप्त करने वालों का पता लगाया जा रहा है तथा मामले में आगे की कानूनी कार्रवाई की जा रही है।

पुलिस के अनुसार, 'एसिटिक एनहाइड्राइड' अफीम या मॉर्फिन को हेरोइन (ब्राउन शुगर) में बदलने के लिए इस्तेमाल होने वाला प्रमुख रसायन है। इसके बिना मॉर्फिन को उच्च गुणवत्ता वाली हेरोइन में बदलना बेहद मुश्किल होता है।

पुलिस ने बताया कि मादक पदार्थ तस्कर अवैध नशीले पदार्थ बनाने के लिए इस रसायन का इस्तेमाल करते हैं, इसलिए सरकार इसके उत्पादन और बिक्री पर नजर रखती है।

बिलासपुर। जिला एवं सत्र न्यायालय बिलासपुर के विशेष न्यायाधीश-2 नविश भारद्वाज की अदालत ने घुमारवीं थाना में दर्ज 1.853 किलोग्राम चरस बरामदगी के मामले में एक आरोपी की नियमित जमानत याचिका खारिज कर दी है। अदालत ने अपने विस्तृत आदेश में कहा कि बरामद मादक पदार्थ व्यावसायिक मात्रा का है। ऐसे मामलों में एनडीपीएस अधिनियम की धारा-37 के तहत जमानत के लिए निर्धारित कड़ी शर्तों का पालन अनिवार्य है और प्रथम दृष्टया आरोपी के पक्ष में ऐसा कोई आधार नहीं बनता, जिससे उसे राहत दी जा सके।

अभियोजन पक्ष के अनुसार पांच अप्रैल 2025 की रात को कीरतपुर-नेरचौक फोरलेन की टनल नंबर-4 के समीप पुलिस टीम नाकाबंदी कर वाहनों की जांच कर रही थी। इसी दौरान मंडी की ओर से आ रही एक कार को जांच के लिए रोका गया। तलाशी लेने पर वाहन की अगली सीट के नीचे से चिपकने वाली टेप में लिपटे चार पैकेट बरामद हुए। जांच में इनमें कुल 1.853 किलोग्राम चरस पाई गई। इसके बाद पुलिस ने एनडीपीएस एक्ट की धाराओं 20 और 29 के तहत मामला दर्ज कर आरोपी को गिरफ्तार किया। जमानत याचिका में आरोपी की ओर से दलील दी गई कि गिरफ्तारी के समय उसे लिखित रूप में गिरफ्तारी के आधार (ग्राउंड्स ऑफ अरेस्ट) उपलब्ध नहीं कराए गए, जिससे गिरफ्तारी और उसके बाद की न्यायिक कार्रवाई कानून के अनुरूप नहीं मानी जा सकती। बचाव पक्ष ने सुप्रीम कोर्ट के मिहिर राजेश शाह बनाम महाराष्ट्र राज्य तथा डॉ. राजेंद्र राजन बनाम भारत संघ मामलों के निर्णयों का हवाला देते हुए जमानत देने का आग्रह किया। वहीं, राज्य सरकार की ओर से जमानत का विरोध करते हुए कहा गया कि मामले में बरामद चरस कमर्शियल मात्रा की है, एफएसएल रिपोर्ट में बरामद पदार्थ के चरस होने की पुष्टि हो चुकी है तथा आरोपी के विरुद्ध अन्य आपराधिक मामले भी दर्ज हैं। ऐसे में उसे जमानत देना जांच और न्यायिक प्रक्रिया के हित में उचित नहीं होगा।

अदालत ने अपने आदेश में कहा कि इस मामले में लिखित रूप से गिरफ्तारी के आधार उपलब्ध न कराने का तर्क जमानत का आधार नहीं बन सकता। अदालत ने यह भी कहा कि गिरफ्तारी मेमो से स्पष्ट है कि आरोपी को यह बताया गया था कि उसे किस एफआईआर और किन धाराओं के तहत गिरफ्तार किया गया है तथा उसके परिजनों को भी इसकी सूचना दी गई थी। विशेष अदालत ने कहा कि कमर्शियल मात्रा के मामलों में एनडीपीएस एक्ट की धारा-37 के तहत जमानत तभी दी जा सकती है, जब अदालत प्रथम दृष्टया इस निष्कर्ष पर पहुंचे कि आरोपी दोषी नहीं है और जमानत पर रिहा होने के बाद उसके दोबारा अपराध करने की संभावना नहीं है। इन सभी तथ्यों, एफएसएल रिपोर्ट, बरामदगी की प्रकृति और सर्वोच्च न्यायालय के विभिन्न निर्णयों को ध्यान में रखते हुए विशेष अदालत ने नियमित जमानत याचिका खारिज कर दी। साथ ही आदेश में कहा गया कि जमानत पर की गई टिप्पणियां केवल इस याचिका के निस्तारण तक सीमित रहेंगी और मुकदमे के अंतिम निर्णय को प्रभावित नहीं करेंगी।

Kolkata: In a bid to strengthen Bengal's internal security, Union Home Minister Amit Shah, at a high-level meeting, on Sunday and laid emphasis on the need to establish an '[Anti-Narcotics Task Force](#)', an 'Anti-Terrorist Squad', and a 'Special Investigation Agency', modelled on the NIA, in the state.

The NIA will conduct a thorough review of all terrorism and UAPA-related cases concerning the state, people in the know said. Union Home Minister and Minister of Cooperation Amit Shah chaired a review meeting on West Bengal's law and order situation in Kolkata, today.

The Union Home Minister also gave several important instructions to strengthen the state's security apparatus, judicial system and police capabilities.

The meeting was attended by the Chief Minister of West Bengal Suwendu Adhikari, the State Chief Secretary, and senior officials from the [Union Ministry of Home Affairs](#) and the [West Bengal government](#).

With focus on women's safety in rural areas, Union Home Minister directed the implementation of a 'Women Outreach Programme.' He emphasized the need to create awareness and empower rural women through regular interaction with officials.

He also stated that the state government could directly contact the Union Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) should any need arise in this regard.

The meeting stressed on capacity augmentation, infrastructure strengthening, and the development of state-of-the-art facilities for the West Bengal Police.

Union Home Minister and Minister of Cooperation assured that adequate budgetary support would be provided for the modernization of the state police and improvement of service delivery systems. In this process, a comprehensive review of the police force cadre will be conducted to increase its strength in line with the national average, and the number of police districts will be rationalized. Additionally, emphasis was placed on filling all vacant posts in a time-bound manner, reviewing training capacities, phasing out reliance on civic volunteers, and prioritizing the recruitment of constables.

A consensus was reached to convert one-third of the security camps established in areas formerly affected by Left-Wing Extremism into Public Service Centres to ensure the access to government services. The need for capacity building in the cybersecurity sector, holding regular NCORD meetings to combat drug trafficking, and formulating a comprehensive flood management plan for Kolkata were discussed.

Police destroy illegal opium crop on over 4,600 acres in Jharkhand this fiscal

Ranchi, July 19 (IANS) Jharkhand police destroyed illegal opium cultivation spread across 4,619.34 acres during the financial year of 2025-26, registering 77 cases and arresting 48 people in connection with the illicit trade, according to a report released by the state CID headquarters.

The largest crackdown was carried out in Chatra district, where opium crops cultivated over 2,742.22 acres were destroyed.

This was followed by Latehar (832.14 acres), Hazaribagh (393 acres), Palamu (314.62 acres) and Khunti (215.71 acres).

Illegal opium cultivation was also destroyed in West Singhbhum (52.69 acres), Ranchi (34.50 acres), Seraikela-Kharsawan (24.70 acres), Simdega (3.50 acres), Lohardaga (3.25 acres), Koderma (3 acres) and Deoghar (0.01 acre).

In Latehar, police additionally destroyed two illegal cannabis plantations.

Chatra recorded the highest number of opium cultivation-related FIRs at 21. Other cases were registered in Latehar (11), Khunti (10), Hazaribagh (8), Ranchi (7), West Singhbhum (12), Seraikela-Kharsawan (3), Simdega (2), and one each in Lohardaga, Koderma and Deoghar. Altogether, 48 accused were arrested during the period.

CID data shows a sharp decline in illegal opium cultivation in Jharkhand compared to 2024-25. While authorities had identified and destroyed opium crops spread over 27,015.03 acres last year, the area under illegal cultivation dropped to 4,619.34 acres in 2025-26 — a reduction of nearly 22,400 acres within a year.

In 2024-25, Khunti had reported the highest illegal opium cultivation at 15,246.79 acres, followed by Ranchi (6,843.47 acres), Chatra (1,566.46 acres), West Singhbhum (796.05 acres), Latehar (754 acres), Seraikela-Kharsawan (678.96 acres), Palamu (604.12 acres) and Hazaribagh (525.18 acres). During that year, police had registered 313 cases and arrested 237 people.

According to CID records, authorities destroyed illegal opium crops over 2,871.02 acres in 2021-22, 5,494.10 acres in 2022-23 and 4,853.99 acres in 2023-24.

The report noted that illegal opium cultivation in Jharkhand has largely remained concentrated in the districts of Chatra, Khunti, Latehar, Ranchi, Palamu, West Singhbhum, Seraikela-Kharsawan and Hazaribagh.

गुप्त सूचना पर पुलिस की संयुक्त छापेमारी

पुलिस ने इस धंधे में संलिप्त एक मुख्य तस्कर को मौके से रंगे हाथों गिरफ्तार कर लिया है। भारी मात्रा में मिली इस नशीली खेप को पुलिस ने विधिवत रूप से जब्त कर अपने कब्जे में ले लिया है। इस मामले को लेकर शिवनारायणपुर थाने में एनडीपीएस अधिनियम (NDPS Act) की गंभीर व सुसंगत धाराओं के तहत प्राथमिकी दर्ज कर ली गई है और आरोपी के खिलाफ आगे की कानूनी कार्रवाई शुरू कर दी गई है।
